INTRODUCTION

A church record is more than names, dates and places. It is about people-- what they did, the how and why of their lives. All of us know something about the church member we worship with each week we even enjoy stories about their achievements and exploits, and we certainly have a fondness for the endearing characters which make up our church family. Yet the knowledge of our church does not often go beyond those members we actually know. Few of us have been privileged enough to have known the great spiritual leaders of the past. This shows us that one of the most common ways of learning about ourselves is by word of mouth; the so-called oral tradition. So if you want to find out about your church the place to start is with the church records.

This book is written to help our church identify and communicate with living members of our family. The information contained in this book is only a starting point for you the reader. It is a general look at names, dates, marriages, birth, deaths, and burials, clerks, pastors, and families.

Our church has a unique heritage dating back to 1827. You will discover why certain names are prominent in our community. Where the families came from. Why they left to settle in Boone County. For most of us, this interest has never gone beyond the level of idle curiosity. Not because we are not interested—what could be more fascinating than to read about the spiritual journey of the early people of our church. But where does one begin to look? What documents should seek?

Because few of us have the time, money or special skills we believe are needed to follow through with tracing our church history, we put if off until later. This is why; I have taken the time, money and developed the skills needed to research our church history. I hope you will find this enjoyable, informative, and valuable.

May God continue to bless our church, and may we never forget the spiritual heritage that has been left to us.

The information contain in this document comes from a number of individuals, sources, church disciplines, monthly meeting records, local newspapers, and Sunday School records.

I have tried to give credit where credit is due. If I have overlooked someone I apologize. It is not my intentions to give the impression that this is my research alone. My only objective is to share what information I have with others and have as much documentation in one source as possible.

Sugar Plain Friends Monthly Meeting, Thorntown Quarterly Meeting, Boone County, Indiana

The early part of the 1800's saw an increase in religious persecution in the southern states. During this time some 50,000 North Carolinians left the state and moved to Ohio or Indiana in protest to slavery. The struggles to oppose slavery on legal grounds led to court battles. Rather than continue the fight Quakers migrated North as laws on behalf of slave owners became more and more restrictive in North Carolina..

Quakers, who in the beginning made up one of the largest organized religious groups in North Carolina, led Methodists, Wesleyans and others to oppose slavery and to work for betterment of slaves. They believed in independence and in supporting the law, but they were quick to take slave-owning offenders to court to right wrongs done to slaves. Needless to say this did not go over very well with their neighbors.

The first Friends to the Territory of Indiana came out of the same sense of justice that prevailed in the South. After a delegation of Miami and Potawatomis visited with President Jefferson in 1802, a delegation from the Baltimore Yearly Meeting also conferred with them regarding their plight in the territory. The Meeting officially protested to Congress as to the unjust practices of the governments' "Indian Policy" and then sent farm equipment to the Miami living near Fort Wayne. The spring of 1804 found a group of Friends in the area setting up a demonstration farm for the Native Americans. This act of caring and generosity ultimately failed due to the power struggles of the two Indian Agents in Ft. Wayne and the Friends returned to Baltimore in 1810. (Rudolph:194-195)

At about the same time, some in the Society were urging Friends in North and South Carolina and Virginia to leave the slave south and move to the newly established, free Northwest Territory. Land here was cheap, fertile, and

abundant. Many moved to the southern part of Ohio and then in 1806, the son of a North Carolina Quaker newly settled in Montgomery County, Ohio traveled just west into the Indiana Territory. He recorded in his Memoirs that he had "...found the country we had been in search of. Spring water, timber and building-rock appeared to be abundant, and the face of the country looked delightful." David Hoover convinced his father, Andrew, as well as fellow Quakers Jeremiah Cox and John Smith to move their families into what is now Wayne County, Indiana. Because fellow Friends looked upon all three men as leaders and because Friends tended to settle together in order to limit their contact with "outsiders", there was suddenly a great rush to the valley of the Whitewater. David Hoover made a wise choice in moving to Indiana. He prospered in his adopted state. He laid out the city of Richmond and later became the judge of the Wayne County Circuit Court. (Rudolph: 196) (See Hamm: Chapter 2 The Great Migration and 3 The Beals Family)

What kind of people were these new citizens of Indiana? On the whole, these first Quakers settlers had only a limited education. Few were completely illiterate but, as David Hoover explained in his Memoirs, educational opportunities in North Carolina had been limited. He illustrated this lack by stating "...I never had the opportunity of reading a newspaper ...until after I was a grown man." As to wealth, the elder Hoover, Smith and Cox arrived with outfits valued between 2 and 3 thousand dollars. Few others could boast a worth even close to this. Most were poor farmers with nothing more than what could be crammed into a single wagon. (Rudolph: 196)

Quaker migration to the area was spirited and, by 1807, the Friends living near Jeremiah Cox's home petitioned the West Branch, Ohio Monthly Meeting for an "indulged meeting" at Cox's Settlement. By 1808, these Friends had a log-meeting house and by 1809 they were organized as the Whitewater Monthly Meeting, with over 200 members. This was the first official Meeting of Friends in Indiana. Through the years of 1809 to 1812 more than 800 Friends were admitted into the meeting. North Carolina Friends, under the leadership of William Hobbs, settled at the headwaters of the Blue River, near present day Salem in 1812, while another group settled at Lick Creek in present day Orange County. (Rudolph: 196)

Through the years of the War of 1812, Quaker migration to the Indiana Territory slowed to a trickle. But at the cessation of hostilities, southern Quakers now

came straight to the Quaker settlements of Indiana. Most traveled from the south, as Elijah Coffin did, in groups to 30 – 40 made up of family members and friends. The wagon trip from the Carolinas took about a month, traveling through the Cumberland Gap on the Wilderness Road, blazed nearly 50 years earlier for the earliest western settlers. (Rudolph:198)

New Friends settlements sprang up in other areas of the state. A meeting was established on the Wabash River, south of Terre Haute in 1820. That same year, when central Indiana was opened to settlement, Friends established meetings in Morgan and Jackson Counties. Within a decade The Society of Friends had also established meetings in Randolph, Henry, Marion, Boone, Hendricks and Parke Counties. (Rudolph:197)

The Quakers Who Settled in Boone County

Sugar Creek Township was organized in 1831. It is located in the northwest part of the county. It is bounded on the north by Clinton County; on the west by Montgomery County, on the south by Jefferson Township, and on the east by Washington Township. It contains thirty-three square miles, sections 1 to 12 inclusive, in township 19 north, range 2 west and half sections 13 to 18 inclusive and sections 19 to 36 inclusive in township 20 north, range 2 west.

Somewhere around 1827 a group of Friends began to move into Boone County. Many were from the North Carolina upcountry while others were Friends from settlements in the Whitewater Valley. These industrious farmers quickly established themselves around the town of Thorntown.. They immediately began worshipping in their homes. Hugh and Sarah Moffitt opened their home for worship. In 1827 three acres of land was donated by Daniel and Betty Rich Odell to be used as the site of what would become know in as Sugar Plain Friends Monthly Meeting. In 1835, the Friends built a log house on the site of the present church at Sugar Plain. Permission was requested from Sugar River Monthly Meeting to establish the Preparative Meeting. In 1840 the Quakers of Sugar Plain were granted their own monthly meeting.

THE SUGAR PLAIN PROPERTY, MEETINGHOUSE, AND SCHOOL

Daniel D Odell to Trustees Society of Friends

This Indenture made the twenty-fourth day of December in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and thirty nine between Daniel D. Odell of the county of Boone and State of Indiana of the first part and Richard Batton, Samuel Rich, and Hugh Moffitt Trustees appointed by Sugar Plain Monthly Meeting to receive and hold a deed to the following described Lot of Land for the use of Sugar Plain Meeting of the Society of Friends of the County of Boone and State of Indiana and their successors in Office of the Second part witnesses that the said Daniel D. Odell for in consideration of the sum of Twenty Dollars to hand in hand paid by the said party of the second part the receipt whereof is herby acknowledged hath granted bargained sold conveyed and confirmed and doth by there presents grant, bargain, sell convey and confirm unto the said party of the second part and their successors in Office and (to the Society of Friends) and their assigns forever all that certain tract or lot of Land lying in the County of Boone and State of Indiana to wit: being a part of the west half of the South west Quarter of Section No. 32 in Township No. 20 north of Range No 2 west Bounded as follows commencing fifty two poles north of the South west corner of said Lot thence East twenty four poles, thence North twenty seven poles, thence west twenty four poles thence south twenty seven poles, to the place of beginning. Containing four acres and eight rods together with the appurtenances thereunto belonging and reversions remainders, and profits thereof, and all the Estate title and interest of the said Daniel D. Odell in and to the same. To have and to hold, the premises aforesaid with all appurtenances. To the only proper use benefit and behoof of the said party of the second part forever. And the said Daniel D Odell for himself his heirs executors and administrators doth covenant and agree to and with the said Richard Batton, Samuel Rich and Hugh Moffit, their successors in office that the said Daniel D. Odell is lawfully seized in fee of the premises aforesaid that they are free from all encumbrances, and that he has good right to sell and convey the same in manner and form aforesaid. And further that he and his heirs executors and administrators shall and will warrant and defend the premises to the said party of the second part (and their successors in office against the lawful claim of himself and his heirs and also against the lawful claim or claims of all and every other person or persons whatsoever.

In witness whereof the said Daniel D. Odell together with Betty Odell his wife who hereby relinquishes all her right title and claim to _____ in the

premises above granted and sold have hereunto set their hands and seals on the day and year above written.

Signed Sealed and delivered in the presence of:

State of Indiana Boone County Sct:

Before me Oliver Craven a justice of the peace in and for said County, personally came Daniel D. Odell the grantor named above deed of Conveyance and acknowledged it to be his voluntary act and deed for the purposes therein mentioned. And also came Betty Odell his wife of the said Daniel D. Odell and having been by me examined separate and apart from her husband as required by law, touching the above deed and the full contents and purport of the same having been made known to her by me declared that she signed sealed and delivered the same of her own voluntary free will, and accord and as her act, and deed, without any coercion of her said husband and that she thereby relinquishes all her right and claim to ______ in said premises.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 24th day of December 1839.

The first meetinghouse is described by Enos Elliott as 24' Feet Square and constructed of round sugar tree logs, the cracks dubbed with mud. The fireplace and chimney were made of sticks and clay and were in the center of the room. The floor was made of split logs. The seats were split logs with holes bored in the under side and wooden pins driven through to make the legs---no backs were used. Around the wall wooden pins were inserted into the logs and rough planks were laid on these to act as writing desk when school was in session. From 1827 to 1835 this building served as both a house of worship and school.

In 1835 the second meetinghouse was built. It was a frame structure with plank siding. Although planks were used for seats they still remained without backs. The outside dimensions were 40'x40'. On the 5th day 12th month 1840 Sugar Plain held it first monthly meeting in this meetinghouse. This building was used until 1852.

In order to accommodate the large numbers attending the New Concord Quarterly Meeting the "Big House" was constructed. It was 64'x 64'x18'. The main plates were poplar, which ran the full length of the building. The building was divided into two rooms, one for the women and the other for the men. The seats were raised three feet in the rear of the room and the front had a preacher's gallery that would hold 100 people. The room was heated with two stoves located in the aisles. This building was used for 41 years.

1893 saw several changes at Sugar Plain. First, the meetinghouse was torn down to construct the present meetinghouse. Much of the materials from the old meetinghouse were used to construct the 32' x 48' structure. The cost was less than \$1,000 for materials and labor. No doubt the years of sitting on rough planks without a back support helped to get approval for factory made benches. A bell was added to call members to worship. Two wood stoves were installed to provide heat. Second, the school was turn over to the county and a public school was started across the road in the red brick house.

In the early 1900's the building was raised two feet and a basement dug by the men of the church. A one-register furnace was installed to heat the upstairs and the platform was extended to the west wall. Later, the balcony was closed off and the floor leveled for two classrooms. In the 1950's running water was piped into the church basement and a restroom installed. In 1959 the entrance was built on the front of the meetinghouse. Around 1972 a gas-fired furnace was installed replacing the stoker furnace. Around 1972 the ceiling was lowered.

EDUCATION

The history of Quaker education in Indiana is the history of a swiftly moving development. Sugar Plain Friends Meeting played an important role in the development of education in Indiana. The following is information complied concerning that development.

"Conditions of life were of course rough and hard in the early period. The forests had to be cleared, almost all the food for the family has to be got off the farm, and all the cloth had to be made from the raw home-grown wool and flax, so that everybody worked, from the oldest to the youngest, and there was little leisure for relaxation or for culture. But from their first arrival in the new world

beyond the Ohio, these Friends began for the right education of their children, and all the meeting records reveal a deep concern for good schools." (Later Periods of Quakerism, I, 413-The Contribution of the Society of Friends To Education In Indiana by Ethel McDaniel, 1939.)

Quaker schools were not started to prepare children for college but rather for life. An old German, at one time a member of the Government Education Bureau, said of the Friends: "The Quakers have the true idea of education. They educated the body, intellect, and heart together, which is the true system of education, for if you educate the intellect alone, you have a cold and formal Christian, or if you cultivate the heart and emotions alone, you have a fanatic, with his hobbies. Quakers solved this problem by training their children to manual labor on the farm, while their minds were trained in the school-room, and their spiritual training was promoted in their meetings where they... were taught to listen to the voice of the Spirit." (Quoted in Autobiography of Allen Jay Philadelphia, 1910. pp. 68-69)

Discipline in the Quaker school was varied, in the early years, "Beech and hazel rods had a wonderfully stirring effect on both mind and body." In later years Quaker discipline removed the rod. "The Quaker schoolmaster did not rule with a rod. Rarely if ever, was one kept in the schoolhouse, and for my part, I have no recollection of ever having seen the rod applied to any pupil in a Quaker school. They maintained perfect order and strict discipline. This was done by moral power and not by physical force. If a boy or girl violated the rules he was at once expelled from the school and sent home, bearing a letter stating the cause, and he was not permitted to return until brought back by the parent, and being there, was required to state in the presence of the school an apology for his ill conduct, and a promise, if permitted to return, to thereafter conduct himself or herself, as the case might be, in a proper manner as a pupil of the school."

Sugar Plain had a large influence in the Thorntown area. "Walnut Grove School stood beside Walnut Grove meetinghouse and was under the direct control of Sugar Plain Monthly Meeting. In 1869 school was held in a frame school building, which stood just south of the meetinghouse. A raised boardwalk, for the convenience of attendance at midweek meeting, connected the meetinghouse and school. Thorntown meeting had an elementary school for only a short time. The dates seem to have been lost. It was under the care of Sugar Plain Monthly

Meeting. Sugar Plain Academy, west of Thorntown, started in the early 1830's as a small subscription school in the meetinghouse.

When Harvey Thomas became head of the school, the higher branches were taught, and one or two assistant teachers were engaged. The high-school course was inaugurated about 1841 and continued until 1893.

As early as 1860 public money was used, but the school continued under the direction of Friends. The school was taken over completely by the public-school system in 1893. In 1893 a brick schoolhouse was constructed across from the meetinghouse. The schoolhouse was converted into a dwelling and is presently owned by Florence Peery.

In 1841 the Committee on Education made the following report.

1st There are about ninety-five children of Friends of suitable age to be sent to school.

2nd There are about thirty-nine educated in friends schools.

3rd There are two children educates in a school taught by a Friend but not a Friends school.

4th There are about thirty children educated in school not instituted by the monthly meeting nor taught by Friends.

5th There are no children growing up without receiving some education.

6th We have established one school for four months the past year.

7th There is no meeting of Friends, which have no school.

This report was satisfactory and was directed to be forwarded to the Quarterly Meeting.

The branches of learning taught at Sugar Plain were Spelling, Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Geography, English Grammar, Natural Philosophy, Algebra, History, and Chemistry. The Holy Scriptures are read as a textbook and the teachers read a portion each day to the scholars.

There were no Quaker children growing up without an education. (Report of the Committee on Education 1841)

In 1852 there still remained a concern for the education of the children at Sugar Plain.

"The committee makes regular reports once each year to the Meeting that appointed it. The Committee on receiving the subject of education within our limits feels encouraged and gratified in the belief that the minds of Friends are generally becoming more alive to this interesting concern; and that there is an increasing unity of feeling and sentiment on the subject amongst us. Yet it will be seen from the report that a considerable number of our dear children have not had the benefit of attending our schools. Towards this portion of our members together with their parents our minds and sympathies have been turned with ardent desire that a way may be opened whereby these tender plants may be placed whilst obtaining their school education under the superintendence of Society of Friends.

Children are very imitative, and we feel that there is a great responsibility resting on parents and the Society with regards to the right training of our beloved youth upon which as we believe the well being of our Society greatly depends. We would therefore affectionately encourage Friends generally to give the subject that attention which the importance of it demands; and we would particularly say to our dear Friends whose locations are inconvenient to our schools and to the Society, the we sympathize with your on the account of your difficulties herein; we kindly but earnestly solicit your serious attention to the subject, together with your labor as ability may be afforded and we believe that a way will open for your enlargement herein where there now appears to be no way, much to your comfort and peace of mind. Taken form the minutes of the Committee on Education held 8th mo 4th, 1852"

Required Dress For Students At Sugar Plain Academy

Taken from the Minutes of the Monthly Meeting

Dress has always been a problem for the youth of any generation. Early Quaker children at Sugar Plain were no different, as indicated by the minutes of 12th mo 1848. There seemed to be a considerable variety of opinions even among Friends in the regards to what articles of dress were considered plain. There were even articles of plain dress not considered to be plain. It was the concern of the monthly meeting to advise on what was and was not acceptable. The reason given was, ". . .there is generally in youth a proneness to gayety, and to follow the vain amusements and imaginary pleasure of the superfluous worldling

and this proneness is very much fostered and encouraged by the variety of opinions." (Concerning plainness)

These cares combined with others, which might be named, produce the difficulty alluded to above and which to the true and profound Philosopher, or the devoted Christian would be but a small thing, and soon overcome, but surrounded as we are infirmity, and in any besetting influences, it is one of no ordinary size to us.

We therefore propose as follows:

First, that the cut of the coats of the boys, members of our Society who may be hereafter be admitted into our Quarterly Meeting School be of the round breast form which has so generally and so long been approved and used by Friends; and that they be careful to keep their hair cut all over the head to a suitable and becoming length in accordance with what has been approve by exemplary Friends here to fore; that decent hats be over the entire headdress that they have their overcoats, vests and other articles of dress about in accordance with the cut above described and in comforts are used should be of a plain and uniform color.

Second, the girls who are members are to avoid the use of vails for the face, pleated bosom dresses, corset bonds, tight lacing and bustles, as well as the use of the small hood or quilted bonnets in modern use and that their head dresses be either paste board quilted or plain bonnets of suitable and approved size and form and that they wear plain decent capes or handkerchiefs"

"The Sugar Creek Township annual commencement exercises were carried out at Sugar Plain Thursday evening before an audience that packed the floor and gallery and left many on the outside. The program of music and address was carried out as published and everybody was well pleased and happy. The graduates were: Willie W. Doyle, Vern M. McKinsey, Leona A Ferguson, Walter Larsh, Alma Fern Campbell, Vora C Haffner, Anna Woody, Walter McBane, Sylvia Macy, Maurice M. Welch, and Lloyd Graves."

The era of the "guarded education" of Friends has passed. Its history will never be fully recorded. The influence of Friends in education can still be seen today in the public schools of the present, but it too is fading into history.

The desire carried by Quakers from the log-cabin school to the frame building to the brick structure was to be far head of state offered schooling. The major difference between the desire of Quakers and the present day desire can be summed by Rufus Jones when he said, "Early Quaker teachers were not preparing their pupils for college; they were preparing them for life, and they were resolved to have the work honestly done... It was an education, which tended to produce not, indeed, geniuses and leaders, but modest, trustworthy, dependable men and women who would endeavor to preserve and transmit the heritage of the Society. This standard gave Friends a higher educational level than that of the communities around them.

Just as the base of Quaker education lies deep in our history so does the influence. Truly, the contribution to education in the Thorntown area is something Sugar Plain Friends Meeting can hold dear as a heritage to spiritual and moral instruction.

Spiritual Leadership

From 1827 to 1880 Sugar Plain was without pastoral leadership. The normal service for worship was conducted by the "meeting of ministers and elders." On occasion a visiting minister would speak to the meeting.

"Our beloved friend David J. McMullen a minister of the Gospel, attended the meeting presenting satisfactory credentials from Bridgeport Meeting of Friends. His company and gospel labors were satisfactory."

Our beloved friend John Newlin a minister of the Gospel attended this meeting presenting satisfactory credentials from Bridgeport Meeting of Friends. His company and gospel labors were satisfactory."

(Taken from the Minutes of Sugar Plain Monthly Meeting)

After the Civil War there was a religious awakening among young Quakers. Neighborhood meetings began to be held in private homes for Bible and tract reading and then for prayer and testimonies. These meetings were transferred to the meetinghouses. By 1860 "series of meetings" were held after the fashion of the youth home meetings. The preaching was extempore without prearrangement and great care was taken that the meeting should be orderly.

The young and eager leaders of the revival movement were vigorously opposed to the older quietist methods, which they regarded as the cause of static and unspiritual condition of the Society. Many of the older customs, such as plain speech and dress, the emphasis on silence in worship, the habit of rising during prayer, the wearing of men's hats in the meetings, the "plain" names of the days of the week and the month and marriages after the older Friends were generally discontinued within this period.

Singing was introduced because many of the leaders coming from other denominations felt that there could be no revival without singing. It was only a few years later that musical instruments were brought into the meetinghouse.

Other practices, which became general in revival meetings, were the "mourners benches." They became the place of public confession and public testimonies to a definite religious experience.

By the late 1870's Sugar Plain came under the influence of the revival movement. Some of the characteristics of the movement that changed Sugar Plain were it was no longer a mere inheritance nor Quakerism simply by tradition for most members. Younger Friends who had been born in Boone County were replacing Quakers who had migrated from North Carolina. Old ways were being discarded. The need for pastoral leadership was discussed and referred to the Monthly Meeting for action.

In the February Monthly Meeting of 1880 a committee was appointed to seek for pastoral leadership. Those appointed to serve on the committee for pastoral labor were:

Mahlon Kendall Mary Kendall William Elwood Mills Oliver Rees

Sarah Jane Hadley Albert Townsend Elvin Rees Martha Moffitt Julietta Moore Lucinda Moffitt

During 1880 Sugar Plain became a pastoral meeting. Franklin Meredith became the first pastor to serve Sugar Plain.

Revivals were occurring all around central Indiana. "In the winter of 1859 there were profound stirrings of religious interest among the students at Farmer's Institute near Lafayette, Indiana under the ministry and personal influence of Jeremiah A. Grinnell and Allen Jay. At the beginning the youth met for social gatherings, which usually ended with "a religious occasion." (Autobog. Of Allen Jay pg. 81)

Sugar Plain eventually came under the influence of some of the prominent evangelist of the day. Local evangelists and leaders in the revival movement were Luther B. Gordon, brother of Esther Gordon Frame, and Nathan T. and Esther Gordon Frame. Nathan and his wife Esther came to the Friends from the Methodist because the Methodist would not allow a woman to preach. The Gordon's were raised in Thorntown.

Taken From "Reminiscences of Nathan T. Frame and Esther G. Frame Thorntown, Indiana, January 1893 pgs. 462-471

We began the winter campaign of 1893 at Thorntown, Boone County, Indiana. This is the place where Esther was converted and joined the M. E. Church, and to her there were many sacred memories clustering around the old church home, and the place where she had spent so many of the most happy years of her young, sweet girlhood life, with her dear father and mother, and she fondly pictured the things as they had been in the years past. But time had wrought many changes. Most of the dear friends who she loved and knew when she was a girl had passed away into the home beyond, so that when she sat at the window and looked from our place of entertainment to the house that has been her home long years ago, I noticed a tear slightly stealing down her cheek and she remarked: "Nathan things have so changed, the house does not look like it did when father and mother lived there, and I feel almost like I am alone. I thought it would be so beautiful and restful to come back, but my loved ones are all gone." It was the heart cry of the Poet Whittier once more wailing out.

"How strange it seem with so much gone Of love, and life, to still live on."

Yet there is a sweet pathetic sadness from which we refuse to be divorced, as we live over again the happy days of the Golden past, but we turn to the narrative before us.

We went from Jamestown, Ohio, by the way of Indianapolis to Thorntown, the weather being very cold and stormy. Our train was three hours late when we arrived, and snow had fallen to the depth of six inches and there was none to meet us at the depot.

We went to Harmon Allen's, one-half mile through the storm, and awakened them, and were welcomed to their home. Here we rested until morning (Sabbath) and went to meeting at eleven o'clock. There was a large audience, as this was a union meeting; Friends, Presbyterian and Episcopal Methodist. The presence of the Lord was among the people from the first, and many hearts were tendered that day, and the saints rejoiced.

We held two meeting each day, as was our custom. The day meetings were largely attended, many unconverted people as well as Christian were there. We had great liberty in preaching the gospel, and sinners were pricked to the heart, and conversions occurred at both the day and night meetings, and the attendance soon increased so much that the large audience room was often not sufficient to accommodate the crowds who came.

The weather continued stormy, the second week of the meetings the snow melted until it was soft then suddenly it was frozen into ice, making the roads almost impossible for horses and vehicles. The sidewalks in the town were a solid mass of ice, made rough and uneven by being trodden over before frozen, and such was the condition of both the streets and roads, that many predicted the attendance of the meeting would be small; but there was neither loss of members nor diminishing of interest, "the set time to favor Zion had come," and the difficulties only seemed to increase the zeal of the worshippers.

There was opposition among the ungodly professors and hardened sinners to the work, and many were the hard sayings that were launched from the tongues of the wicked; the Presbyterian minister himself soon becoming an opposer and finally withdrew and went among the enemies of the Lord, and fought with Balek against Israel, but he could do us no harm, he only advertised the meetings. The

manifestations of the Spirit with different persons were very marked, working with them according to His own good pleasure.

People attending the meetings who lived a number of miles in the country, and on returning home would tell to those who had not been there how the Lord had blessed the people and speak of those who had been converted and conviction for sin would come upon those who had never attended the meetings.

One man who lived three miles in the country, and who would not go with his Godly wife to hear the preaching, came under the power of the Lord so that he could not rest, and one night about three o'clock his wife was awakened by him making a noise in the room and asked him why he had arisen so early and he replied, "I am cold! I am chilling! I cannot lay there and freeze." He built the fire, but soon came close to the bed, and falling on his knees began to pray; his wife came to his rescue, mingled her prayers with his, and instructed him how to give himself to the Savior, and he was soon converted.

The cold, chilly sensation had passed away and next day he came to meeting and gave testimony to the power of saving grace.

A man who kept a drug store came to the meeting one morning and in the speaking meeting said: "I am a hypocrite, I have been professing to be a Christian and I am not, I have been selling whiskey and doing it slyly for drinking purposes, pray for me that I may be saved."

He was a prominent member of the church, but was soon converted. Many of the young men and women of the town were reached, and scores of them converted, an in giving testimony in the meeting told how they had been led into sin in a club that they attended two or three times a week. They had a nicely furnished room and had told their parents that they met together for social entertainment and reading, but now when they were saved they told us in the public meeting that they met there to drink, to play cards and gamble. These young men met together after their conversion and held a prayer meeting each evening before the meetings at the church, and often souls were brought to Christ in these meetings. One evening they remained at their prayer meeting longer than usual, and the service at the church had commenced. They came in a body to the meeting-house, each carrying a "Camp Chair," and Esther said let the congregation rise and sing "Hold the Fort," which was done with a will, and then the people said Amen.

This was a meeting of great power and the whole town and country for miles was brought under the power of the Lord. I conclude the account of this meeting by copying an article from "The Christian Worker."

Thorntown, Ind., March 2, 1893,--- A little more than five weeks since, Nathan and Esther G. Frame began a series of meeting in Thorntown. The Friends at 'Sugar Plain' and the Methodists, uniting in meetings. They held two meeting each day. From the first meeting these gifted and devoted Evangelists preached with unction and a logic that their adversaries could not gainsay.

They presented their work with an energy that seemed wonderful to those who attended their meetings. They preached great sermons, made luminous by the power of the Holy Spirit. Their graphic comments upon the written word, with many beautiful and touching illustrations thrilled their audiences and enforced the simple story of Jesus and His love, as if people had heard it for the first time.

They sang with the spirit, and with the understanding, and often the people melted to tears as they poured out their souls in vocal praises unto God. Their prayers were the simple petitions of a heart and mind in communion with God, and every one who heard them felt assured that their prayers must be answered in the conversion of sinners, and sanctification of believers; and truly such has been the case.

The display of Divine power was such as have never before been witnessed in this part of the country. More than two hundred and fifty have been converted and many have professed to be cleansed from all sin. The Backsliders' have been reclaimed and many people who had been enemies to each other have become friends, and now love each other. The whole town is under the power of the Lord, and a hush of quietness pervades the community and there seems to be a felt sense of the spirit of God filling the atmosphere; for many miles in the country in every direction people are being saved and some who have never attended the meetings have been converted. Nearly all the young men and women in the town have been saved; the gambling places have been closed up or turned into prayer meeting rooms.

The last week the young men have had a meeting each evening at six o'clock at some of these places, and conversions have occurred at every meeting and then

when their meeting concludes they come in a body to the meeting-house and take their places at the front ready for work. The young women have held meetings at private houses of a like nature and it was certainly one of the most touching and soul-inspiring sights that we have ever witnessed to see more than one hundred of these young men and women who have recently been converted, their faces all aglow with the soul-light, come into the house of worship, filling the aisles from the doorway to the rostrum, while the whole congregation were singing "We praise Thee, O Lord, for the Son of Thy love."

The Evangelists started for Kansas City to begin a series of meetings at Friends meetinghouse there. About two hundred people of our place accompanied them to the train and sang, "Sweet By, and By' while the train was held, then they left us.

There is another incident that may be of interest to mention, which is the only one of the kind that ever occurred in our meetings. A very wicked young man came to the meetings, and one evening one of the young women who sang in the choir went to this young man at the close of the sermon and invited him to come forward for prayer, and with many others he came and they all knelt down and in a moment or two he fell into a swoon, or trance, and many of the Christian people became much alarmed and the ungodly looked on with amazement.

Some mocked and others were frightened, but we told the people not to be troubled, and we and all the spiritually minded had asked the Lord in earnest prayer to manifest in any way that was best, and we believed that the hand of our God was in it, and that this was only another way in which the Spirit of God was manifesting himself.. So the meeting continued until most of those who had come for prayer were converted, and the meeting closed about ten o'clock. Still the young man had not come out of his swoon and to all outward appearance he was perfectly unconscious and helpless.

Soon after we left two physicians, one a professor of religion, came to the meeting-house and asked the young men with him to allow them to examine the young man, saying they believed he was only pretending to be helpless, and that they could soon awaken him, So they began their experiments of rolling him over, stretching him, opening his eyes and mouth, and finally when they could

not succeed in this way they stuck pins and sharp instruments into his flesh, and when these cruelties did not prove their theory true, they went away confessing they could not understand what was the cause of his condition.

About midnight he came out of his swoon, or trance, but said he was not converted, but said though entirely helpless while the doctors were torturing him, he was conscious of the pain caused by them as at any other time.

He stated further that the spirit had carried him in a vision to the place of the finally lost, and where he beheld them suffering in agony and despair---and among them were some of these he had known while they lived on earth, who had died in wickedness--- some of them had been his own companions in sin, and he said no description given in the sacred meetings or by others who had written on the subject of hell could portray the misery that he saw in the short time he spent in the abode of the lost.

He was also permitted to behold some of the glories of heaven. The company of the redeemed was inexpressibly happy and beautiful. Immortal youth was stamped upon their countenances, and all traces of care and weariness was taken away and as he gazed upon that company of the redeemed he saw some of those with whom he was acquainted in their lifetime, who had been devoted Christians, and though some of them had been old and wrinkled and worn with disease when they died, they now seemed vigorous and strong, but while they were thus so changed and glorified, still their personality remained and he knew them as he knew them on earth.

He came to the meeting the following night and again swooned away after he came to the place of prayer, but this night when he came out of the trance he gave a clear testimony that the Lord has saved him.

This young man was a despiser of the revival meetings, and especially was he bitter in denouncing the excitement at such meetings, but now was in his right mind and saved. We mention one more manifestation of the spirit before closing this account.

One night after twelve o'clock we were awakened by some noises on the street, a company of persons signing. Thinking it was some rude people making a sport, we listened, and soon came to us clearly the words in song by many voices

echoing through the still night the chorus of a hymn that had been sung frequently in the meetings. This was the chorus:

O! Precious is the flow That makes me white as snow, No other fount I know--Nothing but the blood of Jesus.

A company of about sixty boys from fourteen to sixteen years old, who had been converted at our meetings, had just closed a prayer meeting at a business room. Some of their friends had been converted and after dismissing their meeting they had concluded a final jubilee to march down the street and sing, "Nothing but the blood of Jesus."

We went to the window and watched these dear young boys in the rapture of their first love for the Savior, and as we looked and listened we were reminded of that company of the heavenly host, who centuries ago sang the chorus of heaven's jubilee song above the plains of Bethlehem.

"Glory to God in the highest, on earth peace, and good will to men"

and of the voices of the little children ringing out, when the Savior was here among men in the days of His earthly sojourn,

"Hosanna!! Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord."

O! that men would praise the Lord for his wonderful works among the children of men. No marvel that the Savior said to those who wanted the children to hold their peace; that if they did the very stones would cry out.
